

Hāunu on the Pā


When we continue working on the pā you will need to add mau'u to make the pā larger. This is one method that produces a very neat finish, but needs to be done with long leaves. You will also be working on the underside of the mau'u.




Start the hāunu pelu by slipping in a mau'u as shown here. Remember when you are working on the pā, your mau'u will be wrong side up so the angle cut on the end will go the other way.




Fold the mau'u up over itself with the lower section about 2 inches shorter. This mau'u is much shorter than you will be using. You want your longest mau'u for hāunu pelu.




Rotate the lower end to the right and then fold it over to become a moe. The top half remains and is a $k\bar{u}$.




Weave as usual but bring forward the kū from behind the added kū.



Weave again and this time you will use the added $\ensuremath{k\bar{u}}\xspace.$




This same hāunu works with separate moe and kū. This is useful when you have short leaves. Slip a kū in as you did for hāunu pelu, but only have one inch sticking out.



Lay down a moe.

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Weave as for hāunu pelu.
