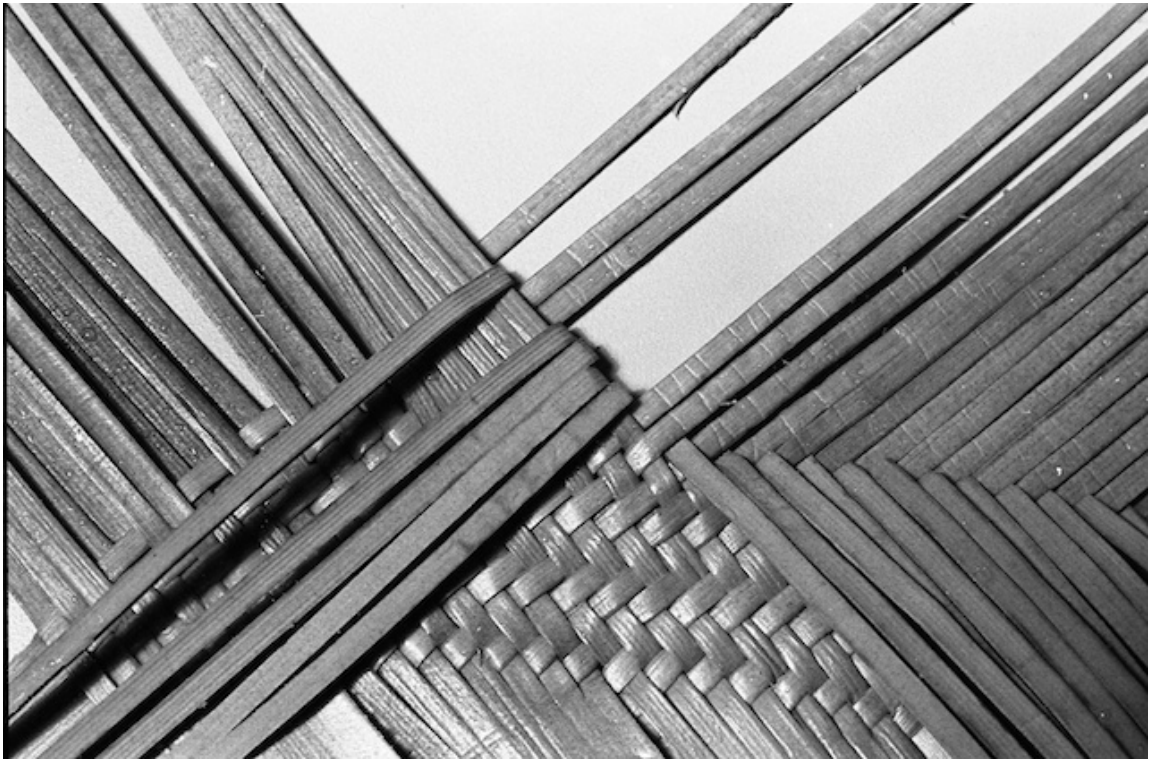
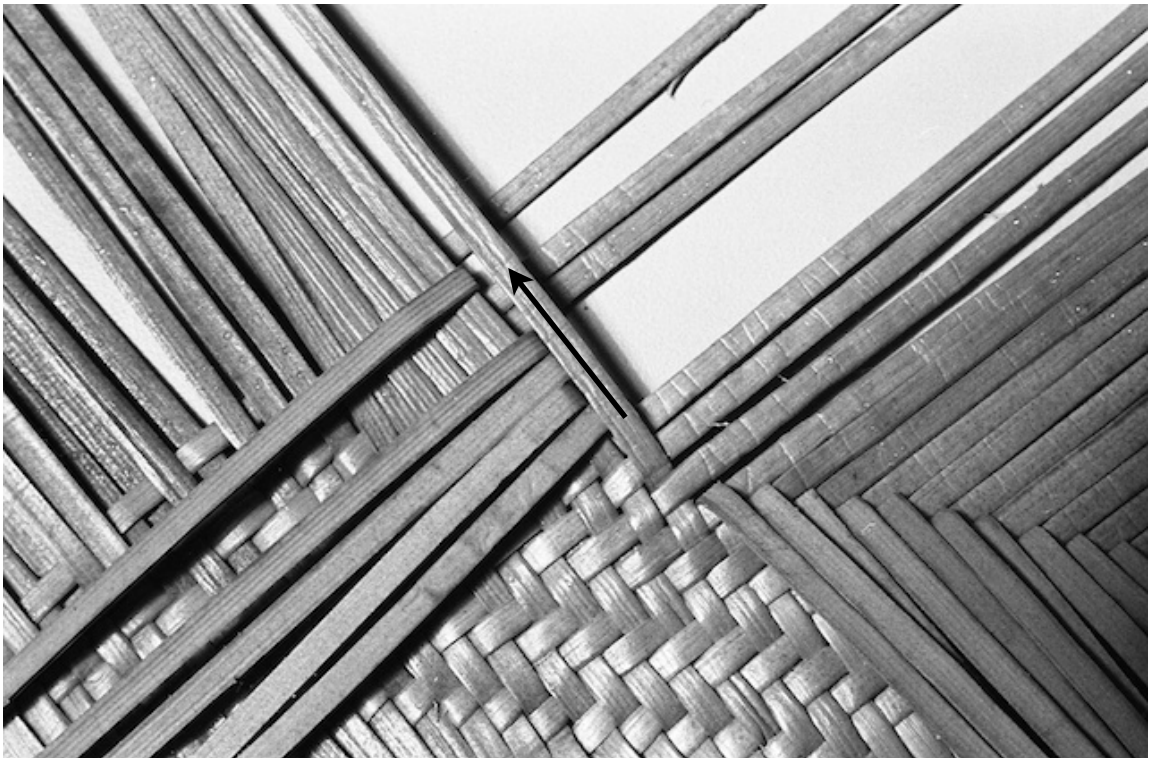


Pawehe

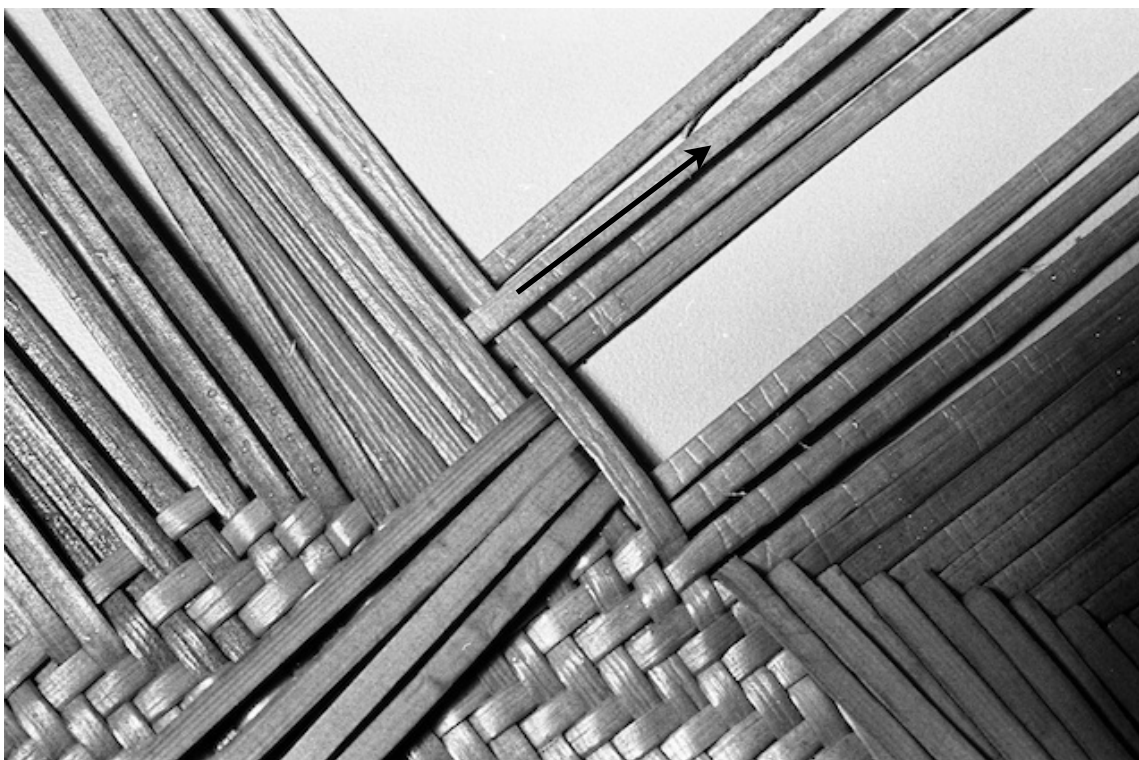
This weaving pattern is a simple one that makes a nice contrast to the regular 'o'eno weave on the crown (ipu) and/or brim ('ēkeu) of the pāpale. If possible, arrange your adds so the count of kū is divisible by four, especially on a two-tone hat. Use it on a row where you won't have to add, about 1/3 of the way down the side of the crown or on the brim about 2/3 of the way out from the ipu.



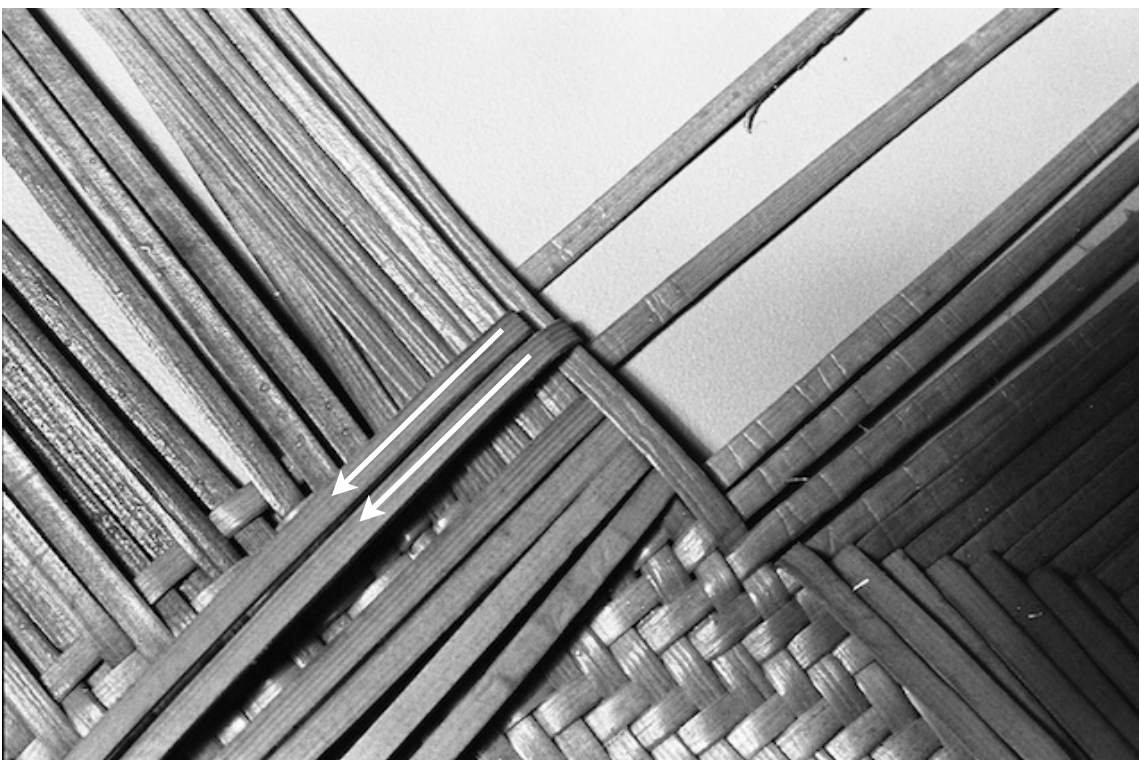
This is the beginning setup for the pawehe pattern.



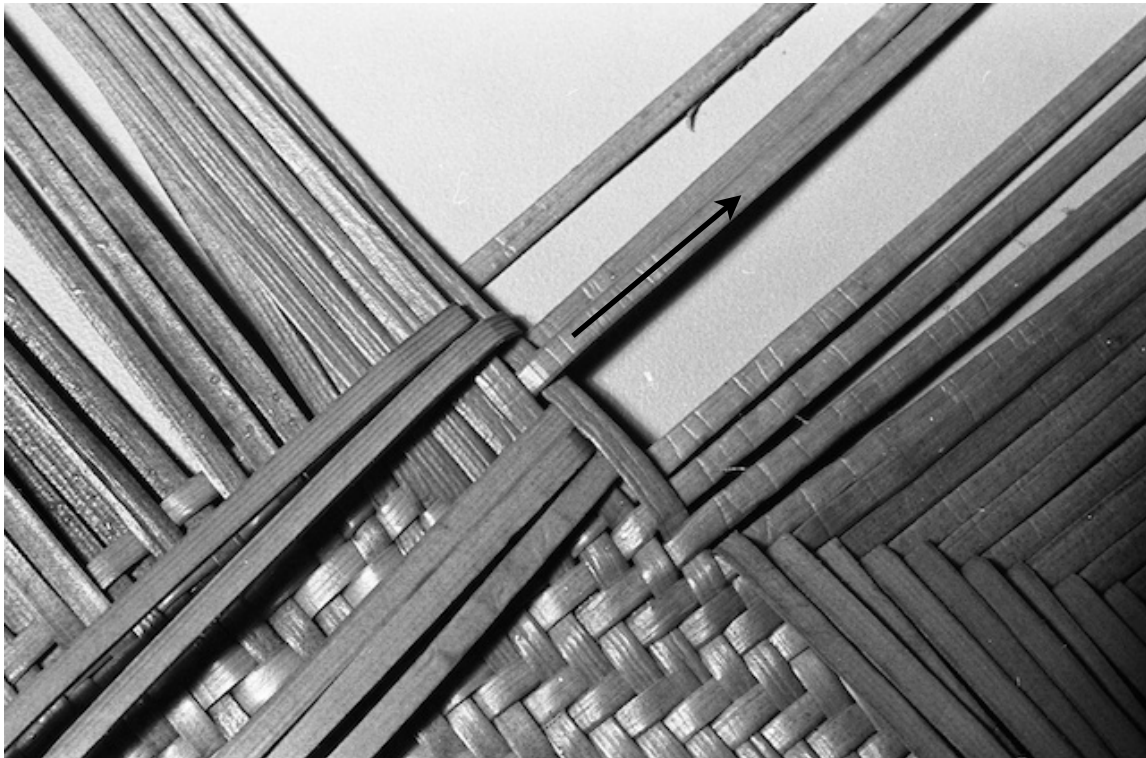

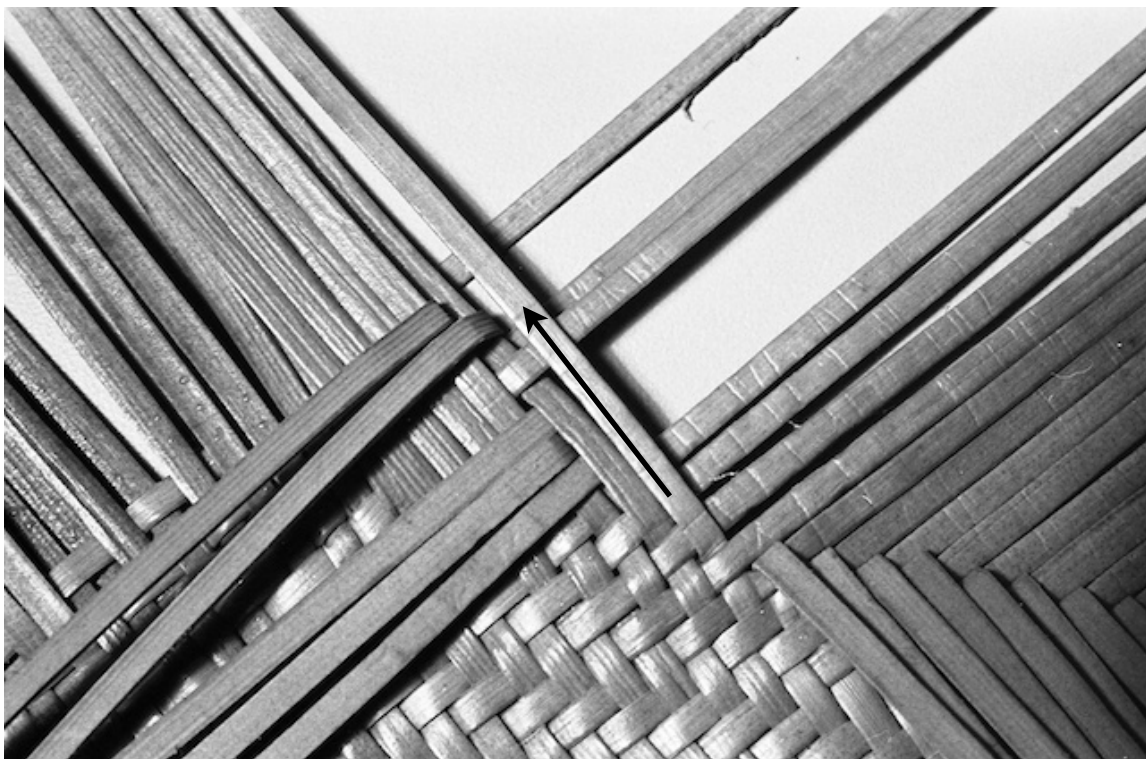
Fold the kū shown to the upper right. We will be weaving one maka of maka 'o'eno on this side.



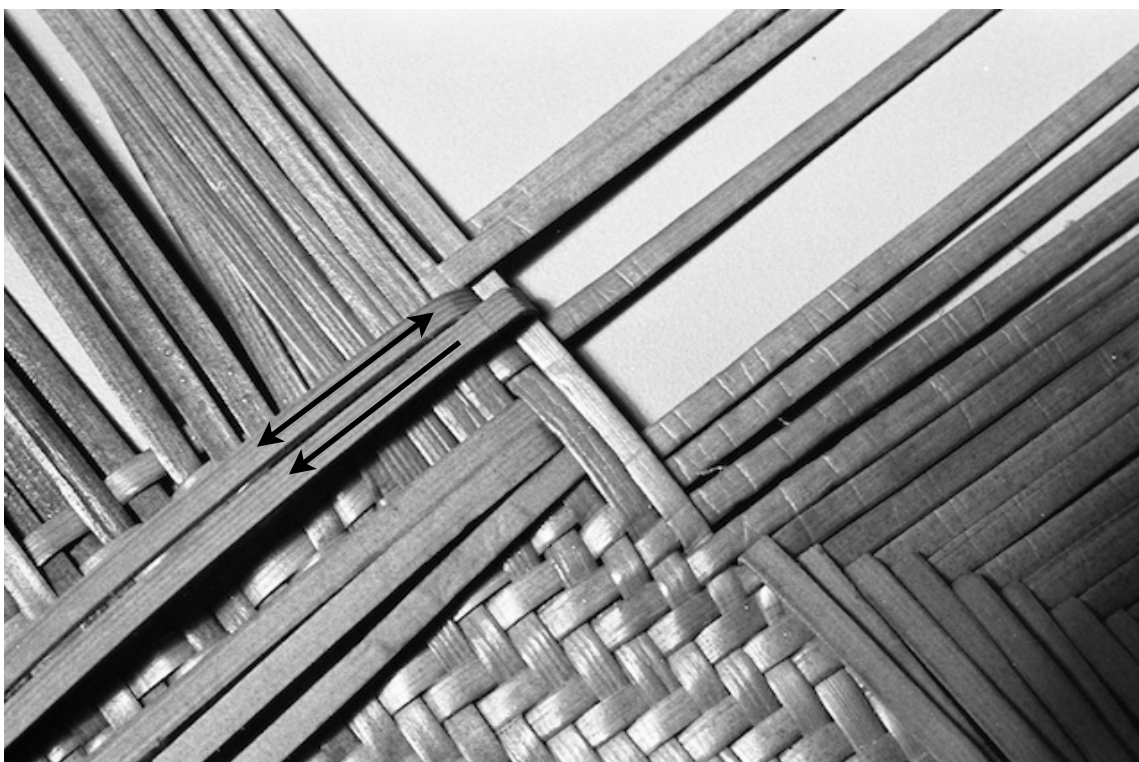
Now fold two kū to the lower left as shown.



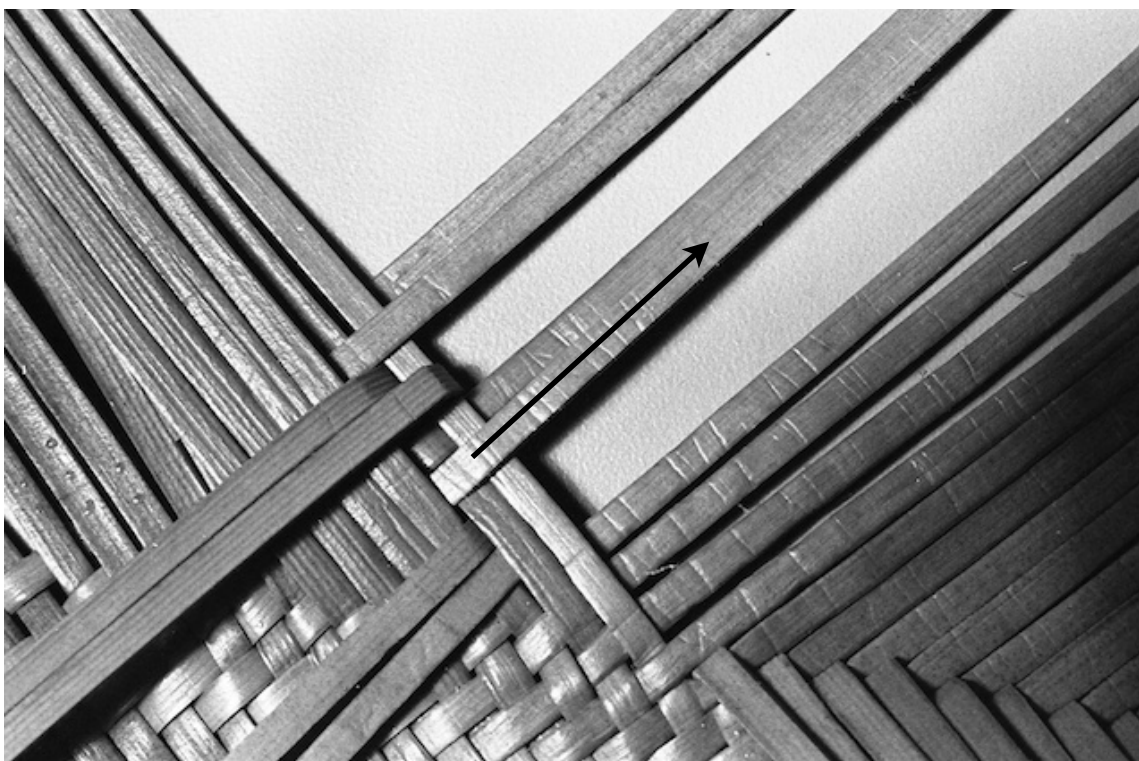
Fold up the kū shown.



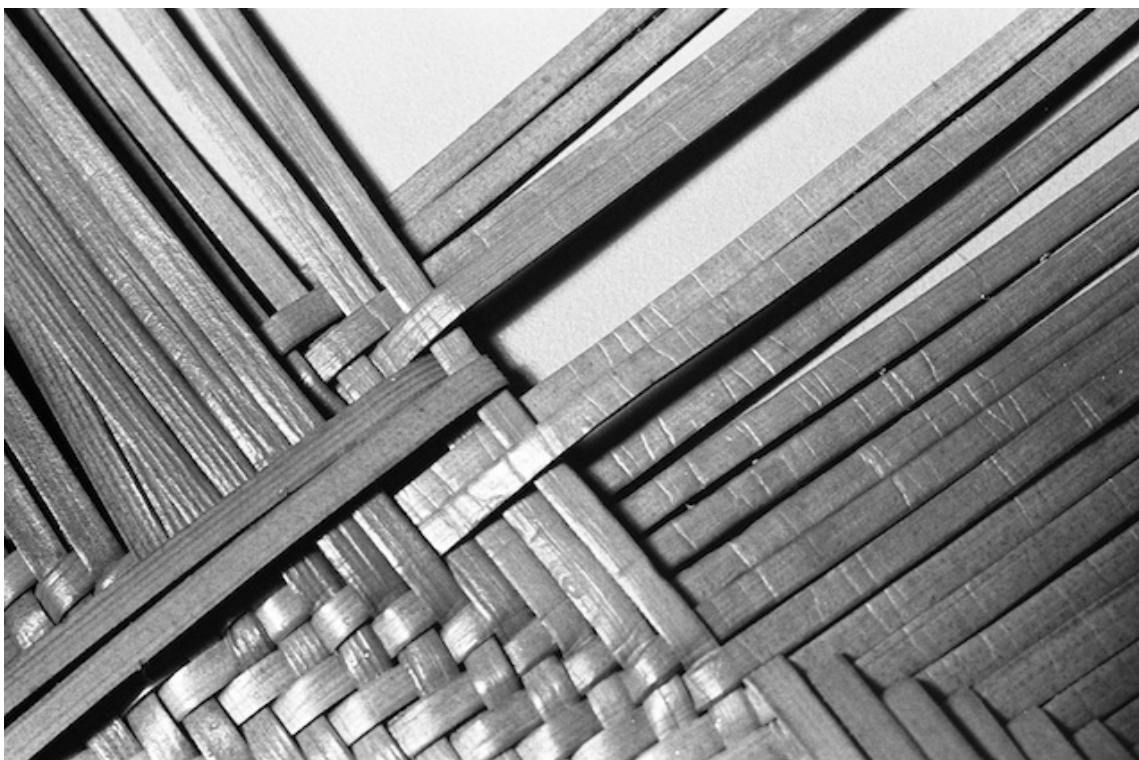
Moe.



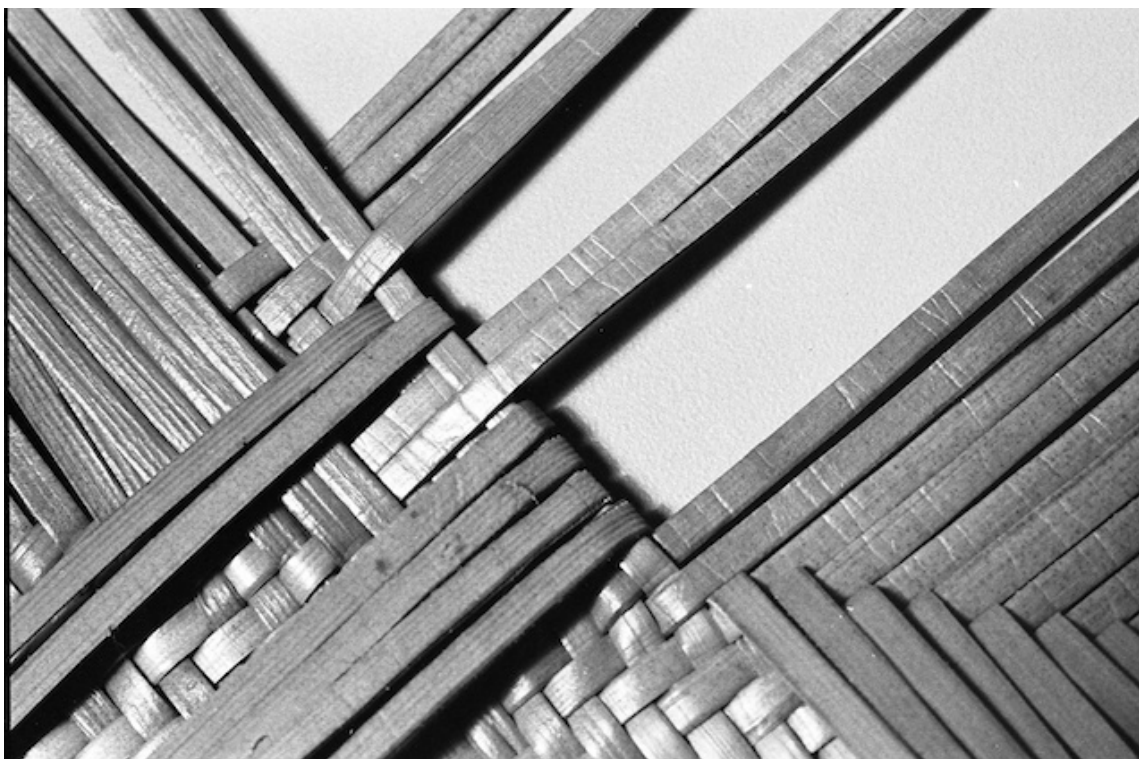
Weave 'o'eno.



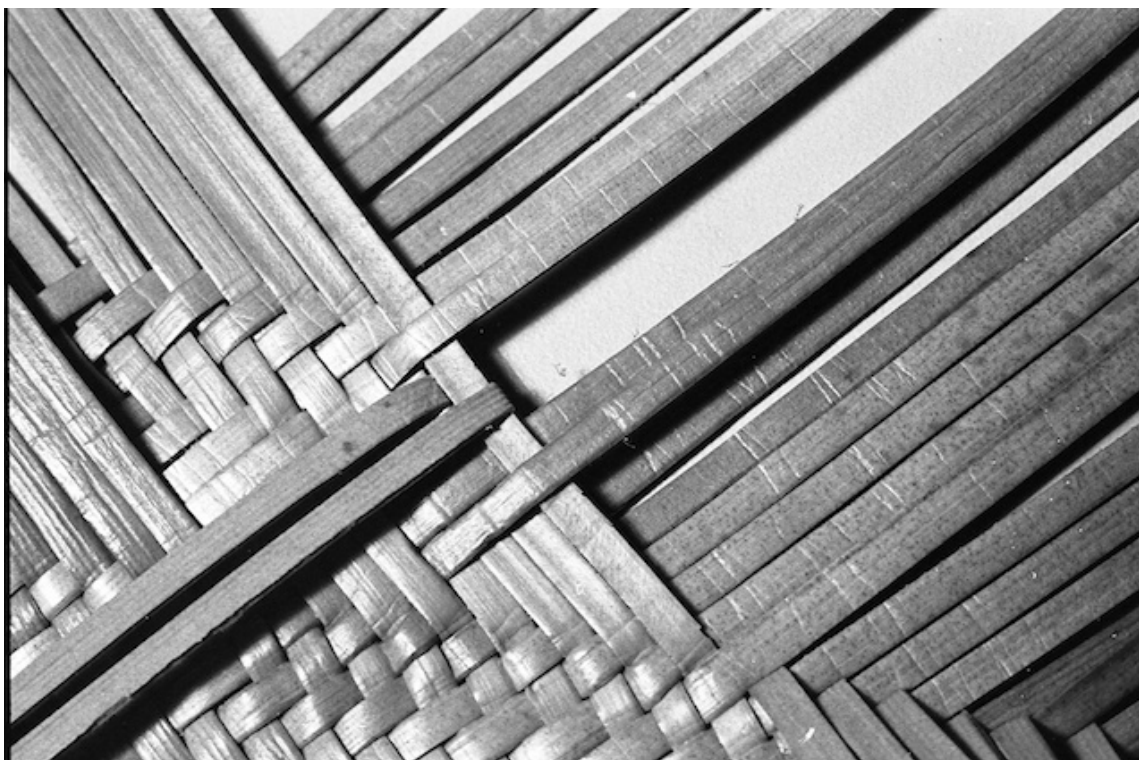
Replace kū.



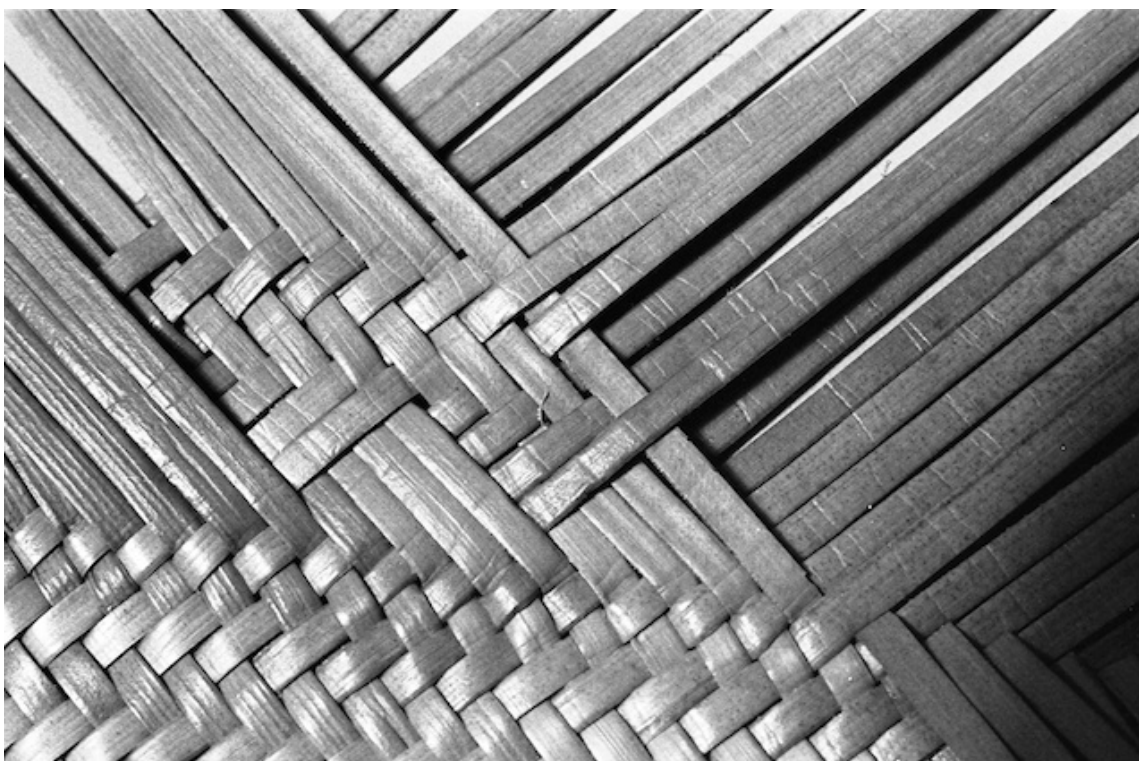
Continue in this manner until all the kū in the right section are up to the right.



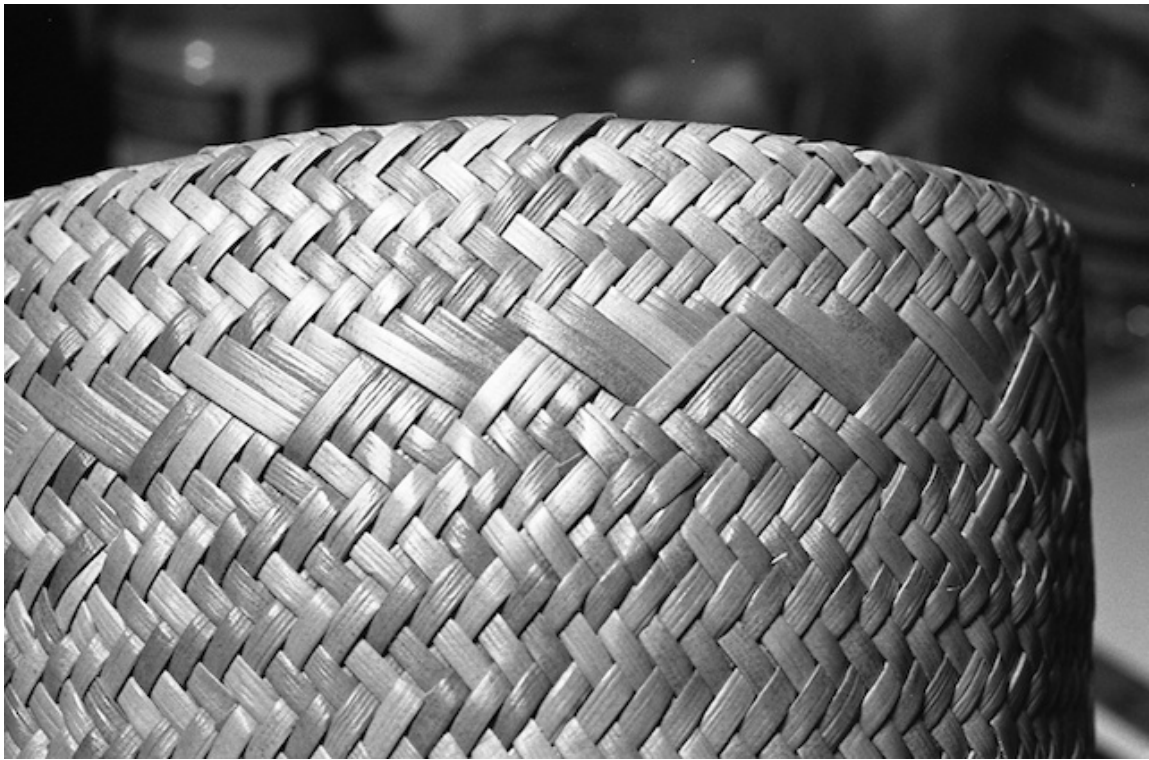
Fold down four more kū as shown.



Continue to weave until those four are used.



Here all the kū are moved to the upper right to illustrate the pattern.
